## **Hawaii State Legislature**


- > Hawaii State Capital Building is open to the public

OR




Have the Senate and House Agree On The Exact Wording Be signed or allowed to become law or vetoed by the Governor Senate and House successfully override the Governor's veto

## Life of a Bill



## ad·vo·ca·cy

/'advəkəsē/

1.public support for or recommendation of a particular cause or policy.



## Advocate for your bill!

- Submit Testimony written or oral (inperson or remote)
- Offer your view on why the bill should become law (or shouldn't)
- Submit written testimony by the deadline
- Get others to testify, too

## **Testimony Essentials**

- ► Bill number
- ► Your name
- Are you for or against the bill?
- Offering changes/comments?
- ►Why?
- Your name and contact info

## Remote Testimony Tips

- Keep "chat" panel open -- this is how legislative staff will communicate with you.
- Mute your microphone and keep your video stopped, unless it is your turn to testify.
- ✓ When the Chair calls on you, unmute your microphone,
- ✓ If you do not respond you may not be able to testify.
- Members can ask questions of testifiers



## **Oral Testimony Tips**

- "Aloha Chair \_\_\_\_, Vice Chair \_\_\_\_ and members of the committee mahalo for the opportunity to testify today..." is a great way to start.
- Short and simple (may be a time limit)
  - Introduce yourself and the group or organization (if any) you represent.
  - Clearly state your position in favor? Opposed? Alternatives?
  - ▶ Be courteous, respectful, and professional



## Remember...

- You don't have to be an expert
- Stories are great
- Use your own words
- Keep it short

If you don't know and answer, tell them you will find out AND get back to them



## Why Get Involved

- Strength in numbers
- Make a difference
- Become a trusted expert

## Decision Making



After the committee receives testimony on all bills on the hearing notice, they recess for decision-making



During the decision-making process, the chair and members discuss how they want to proceed



The chair will gavel the hearing back to order and make recommendations on what to do with the pending legislation

## The Committee may....

- Vote to pass the bill without changes (unamended or "as is")
- Vote to pass the bill with changes (amended)
- Not a vote! Defer or hold the bill
  - If they don't set a date for decision making, it may not get voted on at all (it will then die in committee)



## The bill is given a new draft number... It keeps the same bill number (SB1, for example), but a new draft number is added to it



## **Deadlines to Watch**



- Triple Referral Filing (Bills) All bills referred to three or more committees must have their first committee file their committee report so that they can be in their second-to-last committee by the following day
- First Lateral Deadline All bills referred to more than one committee must move to their final committee in the originating chamber by this day
- First Decking Deadline for bills to emerge from all committees (with committee reports filed) and be submitted to the clerk of the originating chamber.

## Second Reading

- If a bill is reported out of if its first committee, it goes to the floor - either for Second Reading (its second vote before the entire chamber) OR to have its committee report accepted and to be sent on to its next committee
- It's not set in stone as to when Second Reading occurs



## If your bill moves forward, DO IT ALL OVER AGAIN

- ► Ask to have your bill heard at the **next** committee
- Offer testimony at the next committee
- AND REPEAT AS NECESSARY



# Third Reading

Once the bill is heard by all of its committees, the bill is back on the floor for the last of the three required votes for the bill to move through the chamber

### First Crossover

House bills go through the Senate Senate bills go through the House

- Note that the deadlines for the bills in their nonoriginating chamber are labeled as "Second"
  - Second Lateral, Second Decking, and Second Crossover



### **Second Crossover**

- If a bill passes the non-originating chamber WITHOUT changes, it goes back to its originating chamber and is transmitted from there to the Governor
- If AMENDED by the non-originating chamber, it goes back to the originating chamber where that chamber will have an opportunity to either approve of the amendments or disagree with the changes

## **Conference Committees**

- Members meet to resolve disagreements about surviving bills by the Final Decking deadlines
- If they reach an agreement on the final version of the bill, they will publish a Conference Draft version
- Bill goes before the full House and Senate for one last vote



## Governor's Office

- Signs the bill = becomes law
- Vetoes the bill = dead unless Legislature overrides the veto by 2/3 vote in each chamber
- Governor neither signs nor vetoes = becomes law without signature



## **Enacted Bills**

 Once a bill becomes enacted, it becomes an Act of law with a number

 Permanent laws end up in the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS)

## Biennium 2024

- When a bill dies during session, in the first year of the two-year biennium (2023), the bills carry over to the second year when they can be acted upon.
- They can be revived from right where they were at the close of the first year's session
- At the end of the second year (2024) all bills that haven't passed out of the legislature are dead
- We then have new elections, and a brand-new biennium starts up in the odd-numbered year
