The Chamber provides high-quality Work-Based Learning (WBL) opportunities for our keiki through grantfunded initiatives. WBL provides meaningful exposure and preparation for Hawai'i's youth that teaches both technical and professional skills while expanding economic opportunity and access to local social capitol. Opportunities include workplace visits, guest speakers, mentoring, certification attainment, industry-specific mock job interviews, and paid internships. Through connecting and developing strong partnerships between local businesses and schools, the Chamber hopes to build a strong homegrown talent pipeline for Hawai'i's future. This school year brought new school partnerships that increased our student and educator reach. New partners included Nānākuli and Wai'anae complex schools, Ilima Intermediate, and Waipahu Intermediate. We are honored to have started our work in these communities and look forward to increasing our reach with new schools this upcoming school year.

We hope to continue this work and increase internship opportunities this upcoming school year.


